3. Some Assembly, Greek-Wired

(Solve only after solving starting Puzzles 1 and 2.)

Welcome to the twin cities! At this convention, these are:

Minneapolis, whose name combines Dakota mni (water) with Greek πόλις (city). Correspondingly, each unshaded row or column in the city grid to the right will contain two answers, whose clues are joined together in one unbroken "stream" (any tags for either answer follow this stream). Shaded squares reflect a river not far away, the Mnisota (for which this state is named). In each stream, where the lengths of the answers are (in order) m and n, cross out the first clue's last m letters and the last clue's first n letters; in stream order, the letters after the crossed-out sections will say what the river reflects (as the Dakota word sota might suggest), and the letters before them will give a Greek-derived term saying how to learn more about this subject.

Saint Paul, named for a figure who wrote many assembly related (ἐκκλησιαστικός) letters. Correspondingly, the answers to the Saint Paul clues (which are in alphabetical order by answer) will go into the grid like the pieces in a "Some Assembly Required" puzzle: Each will follow an orthogonally connected path (with no two unconnected squares touching even diagonally), no two paths will ever overlap, and collectively the paths will fill the entire grid (both shaded and unshaded squares). Each letter A–Y will appear in one shaded square; if that square is the mth from the start and nth from the end of the path including it, note the mth letter from the start and nth from the end of its corresponding clue. In A–Y order, the mth letters will say
